MESSAGE FROM FOUNDER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Mary Torrence Williams

Dear SWM Supporters,

Let me start by thanking you all for your continued support of Students Without Mothers. As we start looking toward our 20th year (2024) it is great to see so many supporters who have been with us for all or many of the years since our inception in 2004.

In 2022 we continued to modify our programming to address new needs our students face since the Pandemic. We recruited a Board Member with a Masters Degree in Social Work who has been instrumental in helping to develop relationships with key providers of services such as rental assistance, food and clothing. We are also working closely with additional mental health providers to help students cope with added mental health challenges they continue to face.

We are pleased to announce the addition of a new volunteer initiative – Student Advisor Volunteers. We have recruited and trained a number of volunteers to work closely with our students to provide support and guidance as they navigate the challenges they're facing without the support of their mother. These volunteers have experience/interest in working closely with youth and are required to attend our virtual training and pass a background check. This program is in the early stages but has already proven to be invaluable in helping the organization address the needs of our students earlier, before they become dire.

We also added two new donor programs in 2022 – Student Sponsors and Student Aid Sponsors. Student Sponsors pledge to donate a total of \$10k over 5 years or \$2,000/year for 5 years or \$167/month. This covers all services (scholarship stipends; life coaching, grief counseling, social services, etc.) for a student for the 5-year period (senior year of high school through 4 years of college). Student Aid sponsors agree to donate \$500/year or \$42/month to provide supplemental services for a student to include care packages, gift cards and emergency funds. It is our hope to gain more sponsors so that each of our 40-50 students have a designated sponsor.

Our goals in 2023 include further development of our Student Advisors initiative, continued expansion of our Board of Directors, and the provision of additional life coaching and grief counseling services for our students. To date we have provided college readiness, scholarship stipends, life coaching, grief counseling and other services to over 124 students (including the students currently undergoing our yearlong life coaching and grief counseling program and will receive their scholarship certificates at the June 2023 Scholarship Luncheon). Be sure to review the statistics overview on page 15 of this report to see the impact our program is having on the students we serve.



STUDENTS WITHOUT MOTHERS LOOKING FORWARD GOALS FOR 2023

Recruit and Train Student Advisor Volunteers

This effort began in 2022 and will continue through 2023. Student Advisor volunteers are individuals with experience/interest in working with youth. Advisors undergo training to gain a thorough understanding of SWM's services and programs as well as programs available through partner organizations. Once volunteers pass a background check they are assigned two to three students who they touch base with at least monthly to ensure that the student is not experiencing any challenges in areas including financial, homelessness, medical needs, etc. The volunteers are trained to work closely with the student in finding solutions to their challenges and SWM staff is kept in the loop via a monthly reporting system.

Continue to Expand the Life Coaching & Grief Counseling Services

Continue to expand the Life Coaching and Grief Counseling services which have proven so invaluable to program participants. Provide safe environments within which students may learn to cope with the devastating trauma of losing a mother at a young age. Provide the tools students may use to ensure their long term personal mental health and individual and career success. Continued expansion for 2023 will include polling college students to learn more about topics they would like to see added in hopes of increasing their attendance and participation. The organization will also continue to develop relationships and partner with other organizations to provide the essential services our students need.

Continue to Expand the SWM Board

Recruit additional experienced, committed Board members who are willing to fulfill the SWM Board Responsibilities. Board members will be recruited through the United Way VIP Board Training program and the efforts of current board and Advisory Board Members.

STUDENTS WITHOUT MOTHERS, INC. COLLEGE READINESS AND LIFE COACHING PROGRAM

SWM offers guidance and services to underserved, low-income, and diverse youth, who have lost their mothers, so they can graduate from high school, attend college, and earn post-secondary credentials for sustainable financial security.

Programming

Our evidence-based and results-oriented College Readiness program model provides wraparound services to students who have lost their mothers and is designed to provide both advocacy and support to help students consistently make the best choices as they plan for their future. Programming affords students the advantage they need to succeed in college and ultimately in the workplace as successful leaders. The organization develops relationships with each student and follows them through their college/higher education career. This enables SWM to track students as well as help to address barriers and stumbling blocks to school completion. Our holistic service continuum creates opportunities for youth to develop their talents and college readiness competencies through specific skill building and life transition programming. It includes life skill development, mentoring, guidance on applying and getting into college, emotional support, and more. Diverse and historically underserved students are motivated to complete their high school education on-time, to prepare for post-secondary education and life, and to ready themselves to pursue a career in high growth/high demand fields.

There are few programs that exist to help youth who have lost a parent overcome their various challenges, which include the loss of the family structure, the loss of a stable home environment (which may include dependable shelter, clothing and/or food), and the absence of a nurturing adult.

Wrap Around Services

The emotional support and personal attention students receive through the program helps ensure they will get through a critical period in their lives and transition to a college environment, and ultimately into young adulthood. They are afforded the guidance and direction needed to succeed - the kind of support a mother would give.

- College Preparation Programming offers life-changing assistance for students by establishing a path for success through ongoing sessions, support, and guidance that develop college readiness. The aims of our programming are to encourage and prepare our students to attend a two- or four-year institution of higher learning, and to increase the number of minority students entering and remaining enrolled in college. Topics covered include Transitioning to Adulthood, Selecting a College and a Major, Scholarships and Financial Aid, Technology and Social Media Etiquette, and more.
- Life Coaching The curriculum covered in the life coaching sessions serve to ensure that program participants get through a critical life period and are adequately prepared to transition to college and into young adulthood. Participation in our career and life readiness program helps students grow their strengths and mitigate their life challenges, and they learn the skills they need to direct their path. It provides students with the advantage needed to succeed in college and the workplace as successful leaders. Topics include Life Skills, Financial Literacy, Relationship Development, Conflict Resolution Skills, and Healthy Choices.
- Mentoring and Guidance Research demonstrates that the number one reason for success for students with many barriers is having a caring, loving adult to provide support and guidance. SWM pairs each student with an adult volunteer, who have been trained and undergone a background check to offer this support.
- **Grief Counseling** Students engage with trained counselors that assist them in healing from the trauma of losing a parent as well as build resiliency skills for success.
- Emergency Funds, Social Services, and Access to Resources Programming mitigates barriers to success including helping to meet basic needs, linkages to other services, and ensuring access to resources. For instance, students receive yearly stipends to help with college expenses if they remain program eligible. Additionally, students receive a laptop computer donated by our technology partner and additional school/dorm supplies gathered through in-kind support.

Participants are supported in their college journey ensuring that they perform well in school and graduate becoming successful contributors to their communities, despite their barriers and loss of traditional nurturing parents. Since 2004, we have equipped over 120 students for graduation, college, and adulthood.

SWM offers HOPE by providing the guidance and support for college preparedness, transition to adulthood, and life success for low-income young people in Metro Atlanta who have lost their mother.



Students Without Mothers Donor Programs

SWM's Donor Programs are designed to provide consistent financial support for the organization throughout the year. Funds are used to provide the financial assistance and vital services our students need in order to continue their education. Those services include scholarship funds, life coaching, grief counseling and other resources. A portion of the Circle funds are specifically earmarked for the scholarship reserve fund.

Student Sponsor Donors

Fully support a student for their entire 5 years in the program (senior year of high school through 4 years of college), by donating a total of \$10k over a 5-year period (or \$2k a year or \$167/month for 5 years). Your donation covers annual scholarship disbursements; life coaching; grief counseling; dormitory supplies; a laptop computer; gift cards and emergency funds

Student Aid Sponsor Donors

Provide supplemental support for a student for a one-year period, by donating a total of \$500 (or \$42/month). Your donation covers care packages (2 per school year); gift cards and emergency funds.

Circle Donors

Commit to donating a minimum donation of \$5,000 per-year (Chairman's Circle) to cover a full, four-year scholarship (annual stipends of \$1,000 each) plus funding for the Student Emergency and Gift Card Program Fund. Or, commit to donating a minimum of \$1,000 per year (Director's Circle) to cover one annual scholarship stipend of \$1,000.

Student Advisor

Student Advisor volunteers are required to attend our virtual training and pass a background check. This position is ideal for those who enjoy working with youth. Each volunteer is assigned two or three students and will work closely with these students, checking in at least monthly to ensure that they are not experiencing any challenges. If they are, the Advisor is trained in how to help the students utilize the resources of SWM and other partner organizations to get the help they need. 



DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND NATURE OF ACTIVITIES

Students Without Mothers Inc. ("The Organization") is a Section501(c)(3) a not-for-profit corporation that was incorporated under the laws of Georgia on March 4, 2004 is dedicated to helping high school students without mothers help themselves by empowering them to continue their education. The organization's main purpose is to provide life coaching and scholarships to college bound high school students who are without their mothers due to death or other unfortunate circumstances.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The Organization prepares its financial statements using the accrual basis of accounting to present the results of activities and financial position in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Organization, the resources are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into categories established according to their nature and purpose. Net assets and revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, the net assets of the organization and changes therein are classified as without restriction and with restrictions.
